

AUCKLAND ACADEMY SUCCESS!

Five young students took advantage of the generous terms of the inaugural ANZCO Summer Organ Academy, enabling them to enjoy three and a half days of masterclasses, lectures and demonstrations, as well as the opportunity of playing the best organs that Auckland has to offer, all for just \$200. The organs ranged from the tiny but beautifully preserved one manual historic instrument in Ponsonby Baptist Church – the perfect setting for Dr Rachael Griffiths-Hughes’s inspiring lecture and masterclass on the music of John Stanley and his contemporaries – to the monster Klais in Auckland Town Hall, which the students not only enjoyed playing but were able to experience in a guided tour through its inner workings led by

Dr John Wells. He led the teaching team and gave masterclasses on the organs of St Andrew’s Presbyterian and St Matthew-in-the-City, covering varying aspects of technique and musical interpretation across a broad-ranging cross section of the repertoire, as well as an informative demonstration/

lecture on pedal technique at Holy Trinity Cathedral. The Aplin organ of the Maclaurin Chapel, with its no-holds-barred temperament, was an excellent venue for a true introduction to the baroque style, and the students made the most of the opportunity to try their Bach on this


An advance notice about the Wanganui 2014 Organ Academy is also included. This promises to be a most important new direction for all organ students in New Zealand.

Miran Park obtained her BA in Piano and her MA in Music Education in Korea, where she won a university scholarship from the Samick Piano Company Ltd. She has taught at high school in Seoul and was an accompanist for the Seoul Royal Philharmonic Orchestra Choir.

After she came to New Zealand, she was an accompanist for the Korean Auckland Chamber Orchestra and since July 2010 she has played the organ.

She began organ studies with Dr John Wells in 2011, and won the Performance and Audience prizes at the 2012 Congress of the NZ Association of Organists, adjudicated by the French organ celebrity, Olivier Latry. She is currently Organist at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church in Auckland and recently took part in the Orlando Singers' Christmas Concert.

I will play for chapel services (Processional and Recessional) at Haileybury. The following day as well as chapel services I will be playing a lunchtime concert in Aikman Hall where there is a 4-manual instrument. On the final day, I will attend a master class in the afternoon given by John Wells on the Aikman hall instrument."* Daniel is currently studying organ under Don Whelan, Director of Music at the Catholic Cathedral in Christchurch. Council member Martin Setchell has assisted with these arrangements.

Further exchanges between students in Dunedin, Wellington and Auckland are being planned, and we look forward to welcoming young Australian students to this country soon.
