About the instrument...

The organ was built by the Australian organ builder Ronald Sharp between 1972 and 1973. Sharp was self-taught and specialised in instruments with mechanical key action. His largest instrument is the 1979 Grand Organ in the Sydney Opera House, one of the largest mechanical action organs ever built. The Ormond Chapel Organ was rebuilt mechanically and tonally in 1992-3 by the Melbourne organ builder, Knud Smenge. The instrument has 15 speaking stops playable over two manuals and pedals.
