Tom Baldwin is a Melbourne-based organist, accompanist, singer, and conductor. While completing a Bachelor of Arts majoring in literature and history at the University of Melbourne, he served as Junior Organ Scholar at Trinity College from 2012-2013. At present, he is studying for a Bachelor of Music at the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music. His organ teachers have included John O'Donnell and Joshua van Konkelenberg, and he currently studies with Thomas Heywood.

Tom is also a conductor specialising in choral music, and is currently Director of Music at St John's Anglican Church in East Malvern.

About the instrument...

The organ in the Chapel of Trinity College was built in 1997 by the acclaimed Irish organ building firm of Kenneth Jones & Associates. The Kenneth Jones instrument replaced the first Trinity Chapel Organ, built in 1923 by the renowned Adelaide firm of J.E. Dodd and rebuilt in 1959 by the Melbourne firm of Hill, Norman & Beard. The present instrument was dedicated in 1998 and is unique both in design and specification; great emphasis was placed on its 'architectural and visually aesthetic qualities', and the requirement that its appearance complement 'the art-nouveau Gothic and naturalistic motifs of the building'. The instrument has 33 speaking stops playable over three manuals and pedals.

The next concert in the 2016 MUSOC is on **Friday 27 May at 1.10 pm** in the **Wilson Hall, University of Melbourne** with **Rex Roxburgh** performing works by Bach, Böhm, Fletcher, Gárdonyi, and Mathias.
